From the Principal Walk to School Day

Today was National Walk Safely to School Day and despite the dreary weather we had many students and their families engage with this initiative.

This event:

- encourages parents and carers to walk regularly to school
- promotes the health benefits of walking and creates regular walking habits
- Helps children develop vital road crossing skills
- Reduces car dependency, traffic congestion and reduces the level of air pollution created by motor vehicles

Children who are regularly physically active are healthier, perform better academically and are less likely to be obese or overweight. Sedentary behaviour can lead to long-term and costly risks of illnesses such as heart disease and diabet es. Walking regularly is the best exercise for your health because you can build it into your daily routine.

The school would like to acknowledge Brighton Woolworths and Brighton Foodland for

their generous donations of delicious fresh fruit for our students to enjoy as they arrived at school this morning.

New Mobile Phone Policy

This term we are implementing a mobile phone ban in line with the State Government ban. For our school this means there will be very little change.

The new policy means students must keep their mobile phones and other personal devices (such as smartwatches) off and away in their school bag while they are at school.

There will be no change to the existing arrangements for students with extenuating circumstances, such as students who use their personal device to manage a medical condition, or for another specific purpose that has been agreed by the school. This also applies while students are attending school activities including camps and excursions.

The ban will help our students learn free from distraction and encourage more meaningful face-to-face time with peers.

We appreciate your support as we implement these new rules.

Term 2 Japanese Update

Students in Rooms 1, 2, 10, 11, 16 and 17 have been learning about weather and seasons. Students have been practising weather vocabulary and discussed the differences between weather in Japan and Australia. Over the last couple of weeks we have focused on Autumn. Students went for a leaf walk to admire some of the beautiful Autumnal colours in the school yard and also collected leaves to use for leaf art. Students recreated the kanji word for Autumn (Aki) using leaves and also used their vocabulary knowledge to write some sentences in Japanese describing Autumn weather.

Also, on Friday 5 May, the Kodomo Ni Hi (Children's Day) festival was celebrated in Japan. We highlighted the event in Japanese lessons across several year levels by making koi kites and learning about how they symbolise strength, good health and success. Other learning so far this year has comprised of Harmony Day,

Hinamatsuri (Doll Festival) and Oshougatsu (New Year), with a special focus on the Zodiac animals and celebrating the Year of the Rabbit.

This year I would also like to highlight the enthusiasm and commitment of our 2023 Japanese Leaders: Lily, Sophia, Jade, Isla, Sena and Penny. They are brimming with ideas to promote Japanese learning at SPS and have already shown wonderful leadership and organisational skills in Origami Club.

A couple of our leaders have provided their own updates of Japanese learning below:

Preposition Learning – By Jade

In Japanese this year we have been learning about directions and to practice these words, we've done a lot of engaging and fun activities. One of which was a guiding activity to score points. One partner in a pair was blindfolded and the other person gave them directions to lead them blindfolded around stuffed animals to earn points. Another game we thoroughly enjoyed was ninja hide and seek. To play, we just hid our ninja somewhere and told our partner where it was, but in Japanese. For instance, perhaps the ninja was to the right of the table. We would say "Ninja wa teeburu no migi ni imasu" – meaning the ninja is to the right of the table. We really enjoyed playing these fun games over written work!

Origami Club – By Isla

On Friday lunch playtime, we are hosting origami club. Students are welcome to come up to Room 7 and make some beautiful creations with us. We have our Japanese leaders (Isla, Jade, Penny, Sophia, Sena and Lily), come up and help run it. Origami has existed for about a thousand years and makes precious gifts and decorations. We are thinking about promoting a project to make 1000 cranes, which means good health. Origami is a fun way to make a piece of paper into a model of numerous things without cutting or gluing the piece of paper. Some are very complicated though some are simple. There are a few that are so realistic that I can't tell the difference. We would love for more people to join us and make wonderful origami pieces!



National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS) is held annually by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, family day cares, childcare centres, family homes, bookshops and many other places around the country. Now in its 23rd successful year, it is a colourful, vibrant, fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Foundation to Year 6.

By facilitating NSS we aim to: promote the value of reading and literacy, the value and fun of books, promote an Australian writer and publisher, promote storytime activities in libraries and communities around the country, and provide opportunities to involve parents, grandparents, the media and others to participate in and enjoy the occasion.

NSS receives positive media coverage and generates a great deal of community interest. 2022 was our biggest and most successful NSS to date with over 2.18 million participants at over 59 thousand locations!

What do we look for in the National Simultaneous Storytime book? Each year, interested publishers send in possible titles. The criteria for choosing from the books include: a positive storyline; appeal to a modern and diverse audience; suitability for read-aloud (language and length); how well the book lends itself to craft and other activities.


