Room 15 Fast Fashion




Room 18 and 19 HASS


In HASS we have been investigating the world and how people and the environment are connected. We began by learning about the world map including continents, compass directions, the tropics, oceans and other things we may find on maps. Each student then got a piece of the world to map, draw and colour in and we put them together to create a whole world map for our class. We learnt about continents, weather patterns and ways in which the environment impacts how people live, but also how people living in certain areas can impact the environment.

Students then researched a country of their choice to further investigate these connections and better understand how people live in other places in the world.









Commissioner for children & young people, Helen Connolly's student voice initiative

Since 2020, students aged 8-12 have been invited to participate in the 'Tell Helen' initiative.

The work of the Commissioner for Children and Young People, Helen Connolly, is directly informed by listening to the views and opinions of children and young people living in South Australia. Commissioner Connolly has heard that the voices of 8 –12 year olds are often not heard and in guiding the work of her office devised an engagement initiative that would enable this group of South Australians to tell her what is most important to them.

The Commissioner launched her Message to the Commissioner ('Tell Helen') Student Voice Postcard initiative in 2019, receiving 8,429 postcard responses from all over the state. The responses came from South Australian children aged 8-12 years attending Catholic, Independent, Government, Special, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Behavioural Schools and represented 239 schools. Their answers to the Commissioner's questions have been subsequently shaped into a report titled "The Things That Matter" launched in National Children's Week 24 October to 1 November, 2020.


Here are some responses from our students in years 3, 4 & 5, to HELEN'S questions:
